## **SYP Childcare Centre work starts**

Work on the Southern Yorke Peninsula Community Childcare Centre officially began on Monday, 9 January.

Romaldi Construction have begun preparing the site located at 11 North Terrace, Minlaton, which includes the demolition of existing structures.

The project will include the construction of the new 730-square-metre centre, carpark, external service yard, landscaping, septic soakage area, stormwater management as well as the demolition of the old tennis courts and clubrooms.

Construction of the centre has been made possible through a \$2.25 million Black Summer Bushfire Recovery grant.

It is anticipated the childcare centre will have the capacity for 80 long-

day care places for children aged 0 to 5.

The centre will require about 20 full-time equivalent employees. "This is an exciting milestone and exciting leap forward for the SYP Community Childcare Centre project," Mayor Darren Braund said. "The construction of the centre will address the shortage of childcare services on southern Yorke Peninsula which has been a longstanding issue in the community.

"Childcare services are needed more than ever with the cost of living rising and workforce shortages affecting the country.

"Council thanks the Southern Yorke Peninsula Childcare Feasibility Group, a collection of parents that have proactively pushed for a centre on the peninsula."





# North Coast Road upgrade begins

The long-awaited upgrade of North Coast Road, Point Turton, has finally begun.

Yorke Peninsula Council received \$1,141,000 through Special Local Roads Program's Supplementary Local Road Funding for stage one of the upgrade.

The upgrade of the road, which is about 11 kilometres long, is a result of years of advocacy from Yorke Peninsula Council and local residents. The total cost of stage one is estimated to be \$1,711,500, with Council contributing \$570,000 towards the project.

Stage one will include sealing the first 1.82km of road, earthworks, stormwater management including the installation of stormwater drainage infrastructure, road delineation and installation of traffic control devices.

"Council is excited to see works finally underway on this popular tourist route which connects to stunning beaches and our popular bush camping sites," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"The stretch of road is also home to about 150 residential properties and in recent times, due to increased road use, tourists and residents have complained about the road's deteriorating condition.

"This project will enhance road safety, improve the road standard, reduce the dust nuisance and impact on residents, improve access to a popular tourist destination, and improve the driving experience for locals and visitors."

Following a Request for Tender process, Downer was appointed as the successful contractor to undertake stage one.

Works commenced onsite on Monday, 30 January, and are anticipated to be completed between April and May, weather permitting. Future works are expected to be completed in stages, subject to

future grant funding and Council endorsement.

Stage two is expected to include a similar seal length as stage one and stage three won't include sealing but will create a better surface for the remainder of the road.

## **Acclaimed artists for new murals**

Renowned artists Mike Makatron and Sam Brooks have been selected to paint murals on SA Water tanks at Minlacowie and Wool Bay.

Concept designs are in the final stages of preparation for both murals. Mike Makatron has painted throughout the world, and was previously the lead artist for the Southern Yorke Peninsula Water Tower Mural Trail pieces at Edithburgh and Stansbury.

Mike's artwork at Minlacowie – a huge tank between Minlaton and Yorketown – will include local scenery that relates to Yorke Peninsula Council's slogan of 'agriculturally rich, naturally beautiful' with prominent nods to Narungga culture.

Sam Brooks' resume includes the Eudunda silos among many other large-scale murals across the state.

Sam's Wool Bay painting will include separate but connected murals on the SA Water site's shed and tank, tying the town and surrounding region's history to its present day.

Sam's work will also incorporate nods to Narungga history as well as the port, modern agriculture and nature.

The artists were chosen as a result of an expression of interest process, and their art will be based on extensive consultation with the Yorke Peninsula community.

"We are incredibly excited to have such accomplished artists

committed to paint these tanks, which will add to our national award winning SYP Water Tower Mural Trail," Mayor Darren Braund said. "The preliminary designs look fantastic and will be improved upon further before painting commences in the first half of next year. "We can't wait for everyone to see these new murals, which will improve an initiative that has already proven to be a significant drawcard for tourists and a source of community pride for locals." The Bulbacowie & Wool Bay -Southern Yorke Peninsula water tower extension project was made possible through \$130,000 funding from the Australian Government through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

This program supports local councils to deliver priority local road and community infrastructure projects across Australia.

The Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said "This new line of untied funding has been enthusiastically welcomed by local councils and consequently we elected to keep the program going past the pandemic,".

"It has great merit in that local councils should be closest to their communities and know where best to invest.

"I am very pleased the incoming government has re-committed to the program."





# Fringe Festival comes to YP

Yorke Peninsula Council, in partnership with Country Arts SA, is excited to bring the Adelaide Fringe Festival to Yorke Peninsula.

The Fringe on the YP initiative has been organised by Arts and Cultural Facilitator Sonya Rankine and included events across a number of local venues.

"The Adelaide Fringe was encouraging regional venues to register and bring Fringe performers out to regional areas," Ms Rankine said.

"I saw it as a great opportunity to register Council-managed town halls as Adelaide Fringe venues in the hope of attracting performers to Yorke Peninsula.

"All five halls, Ardrossan, Maitland, Minlaton, Yorketown and Warooka, were registered and it was a waiting game to see if we were able to gain interest."

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Ms}}$  Rankine said three artists, including comedy and music, were secured.

The performances included Not Here to F\*\*k Spiders by Marc Ryan (each show supported SOS Yorkes), Prescribing Happiness by the RockDoctors and Redneck Greenie – Confessions of an Ozymoron by Robbie Hoade.

"Another crucial element of Fringe on the YP was connecting with and supporting local progress associations," she said.

"Progress association organised food and drinks for the events which was a fantastic fundraising opportunity and a chance to engage the

local community.

"The Ardrossan Progress Association and the Maitland and District Progress association embraced the initiative and are excited to be a part of and see Fringe performers coming to our communities." Musicians Caleb Raymond, Sarah Johnson and Annie Wheare, who have close connections to Yorke Peninsula, also supported the Fringe performers.

"It was important to create a Fringe vibe for the local community to be immersed in and bring that Fringe energy to our communities," Ms Rankine said.

"Hopefully Fringe on the YP becomes a regular feature on our calendar."

While a majority of the Fringe on YP shows were held in February there is still chance to catch the last show at the Ardrossan Town Hall. Redneck Greenie – Confessions of an Ozymoron – Robbie Hoade will be held on Friday, 17 March, from 8pm-9.45pm.

# Take care of the coast

With the March and Easter long weekends just around the corner, Yorke Peninsula Council is reminding visitors and locals to stick to designated paths to help protect coastal sand dunes.

Yorke Peninsula's dunes contain sites of significance to Narungga people, including significant Aboriginal heritage sites which are protected under the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1988.

"Sand dunes are fragile and walking, riding or driving through them can lead to vegetation loss. Vegetation is important as it keeps the sand in place.

Without the protective cover of vegetation, the result is erosion, dune blowouts and accelerated sand movement," Council Environment Officer Letitia Dahl-helm said.

"Enjoy the beach, but stay out of the dunes, as this will help conserve our important dune systems, which have a vital role in naturally protecting our beaches, coastline and inland areas from the destructive forces of coastal storms, winds and waves."

Northern and Yorke Landscape Board project manager Janet Moore said the coast is under threat from the combined impacts of climate

change, increasing vehicle-based recreation, weeds and feral pests. "It is really important to reduce these threats and improve the health of the coast," she said.

"Everyone has a role to play in protecting our coast, from visitors using existing tracks and formal campgrounds, to shack owners and coastal residents planting local native species in their gardens and removing pest plants that 'escape' into the dunes.

"Plus anyone can support one of the many community groups on Yorke Peninsula that regularly undertake coastal protection projects.

"By all pitching in we can continue to enjoy the great coastal lifestyle that Yorke Peninsula offers, protect its unique ecosystems and preserve its cultural significance."

#### Things to remember to protect the environment

- Stick to designated paths and don't venture onto the sand dunes
- Put your rubbish in the bin or take it home with you if bins are full
- Leave it be changing or disrupting the natural environment can destroy important habitats

# Djulda-wawa Badja Project

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board has partnered with Yorke Peninsula Council and local community groups to strengthen and protect the coastline through a project called Djulda-wawa Badja, which means resilient coast in Narungga language.

Djulda-wawa Badja is a two-year project that aims to build the coastline's resilience through practical, on-ground land management activities across Yorke Peninsula.

The Northern and Yorke Coastal Management Action Plan has identified that coastal ecosystems across the region are under threat. "It's important we care for these highly valued ecosystems by increasing native vegetation cover, stabilising soil and sand, and connecting and revegetating fragmented or degraded areas," Northern and Yorke Landscape Board project manager Janet Moore said.

"The project includes revegetation, fencing and weed management and support for eastern osprey with the roll-out of artificial nesting sites at Port Broughton and Coobowie.

"It will also develop an access strategy for priority areas of coastal Crown Land." This strategy will identify coastal access points and subsequent management of visitor impacts.

"Members of the Narungga community are involved in project planning, oversight and delivery and the project also employs a Narungga ranger and First Nations contractors for on-ground environmental work."

# Creating an accessible peninsula

Yorke Peninsula Council is encouraging the community to put forward ideas to help with disability access to Council/public buildings, facilities and infrastructure.

Council's Access Advisory Working Party aims to enhance and improve disability accessibility, mobility and social inclusion in the region. Recent projects have included purchasing disability accessible tables and chairs for outdoor public spaces, installing or upgrading crossover ramps and installing new ramps and handrails at public buildings, facilities and other places where the public gather.

The Working Party has an annual budget of \$25,000 to contribute towards projects.

The Working Party was formed in 1988, when Council brought together a group of interested community members with the aim to provide disability-friendly access to public spaces and decrease barriers to engaging in community life for all.

The group was formed following a public meeting which highlighted the need to consider people in wheelchairs as well as the elderly and vision impaired.

Councillors, staff and Working Party members even travelled around

Main Street Minlaton in wheelchairs to see what could be improved. To date Council has committed \$400,000 to improving disabled access across Yorke Peninsula.

"The Working Party develops strategies to reduce barriers and increase access to Council premises and public buildings," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"It is integral in providing advice and recommendations on Council policy, liaising with key stakeholders throughout the peninsula and making recommendations to Council on matters relating to access issues."


The Working Party is made up of Councillors, Council staff and representatives from local progress associations.

#### **Sponsorship and Donation Policy Adopted**

Yorke Peninsula Council has introduced a new and improved process for sponsorships and donations.

Each year, Council sponsors numerous local events and makes donations toward worthwhile initiatives, as part of its commitment to improving the vibrancy, wellbeing and social connection of the Yorke Peninsula community.

The new Sponsorship and Donation Policy aims to assist community groups and organisations in obtaining funding as well as providing a framework for Council to allocate the funds in a transparent, effective, equitable and consistent manner.

There is now a clear set of guidelines and formal application documents for those seeking sponsorship or donations to fill out and make their requests.

Small requests involve a simple application process, whereas larger events can ask for multi-year funding by taking a few extra steps.

Applicants can be located within or out of the Council area; however, the sponsored event must take place within the Council area.

"Council prides itself on providing community support, and one of the best ways we can do this is by offering sponsorship for, or donations toward, local events and initiatives," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"This new policy will ensure all sponsorships and donations are made based on criteria that is easy to understand and applies to everyone equally.

"Historically, most of our sponsorship budget has been pre-allocated to recurring events, so we want organisers of these events to be aware

of the new process."

Events that Council may consider suitable for the funding generally include, but are not limited to, recreational, cultural, sporting, street activation, and art exhibitions events, other community events showcasing Yorke Peninsula's historic, heritage, cultural, and natural values, awards, and celebrations of home-grown talents.

#### **Key points the new Policy includes:**

- Who and what events are eligible to seek sponsorship and donation funding from Council and the maximum value capped for each type of event.
- How to access the funding via an application process.
- Introduction of a recurrent sponsorship funding option for established events.
- Identification of the criteria used to evaluate sponsorship and donation funding requests.
- Events with the potential to create social and economic benefits for the wider Yorke Peninsula region will be viewed most favourably.
- If the allocated budget is exhausted, event organisers can still seek sponsorship for their proposal to go through the usual process, and a recommendation be provided to Council for consideration.

# **RV Overnight Stays Policy Adopted**

Yorke Peninsula Council has adopted a Recreational Vehicles Overnight Stays Policy.

The policy aims to provide an integral and coordinated approach to meet the needs of the recreational vehicle traveller market for overnight stays while ensuring local businesses, in particular caravan parks, are not disadvantaged.

"The Yorke Peninsula Council region receives an influx of recreational vehicle travellers during peak tourism periods," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"Council recognises the need to develop additional RV overnight stay facilities to accommodate these visitors, especially when caravan parks are at capacity."

Council encourages development of RV overnight stay facilities to deter travellers from camping in areas where camping is not permitted and to provide a safe overnight stay environment.

Authorised overnight stay areas entice travellers to visit the region while benefitting local businesses and strengthening the local economy.

Permission for new or expanded overnight stay facilities, on a permanent or temporary basis, must be sought from Council.

To avoid competition with established caravan parks in non-peak tourism periods, Council's approval of RV overnight stay facilities applying for full year operation will be subject to conditions.

This includes being a minimum 10 kilometres from an established Caravan Park, maximum five night consecutive stay for non-peak tourism periods and managers of the overnight stay facilities required

to implement a registration system for travellers staying at the site. "The policy outlines the balance between capturing the economic opportunities available through the RV market and supporting the needs of local business in the region, in particular caravan parks," Mr Braund said.

"The new policy provides clear guidelines for community associations or businesses to establish temporary or permanent RV overnight facilities."

We would prefer to avoid these situations and encourage timely communication in relation to your circumstances.

Some of the payment options available to you (dependent on circumstances) include:

- · Weekly, fortnightly, or monthly regular payment arrangements (scheduled through your online banking)
- CentrePay payment deductions via Centrelink
- Lump sum payments on specific dates
- Seniors' postponements

If you are having trouble paying your rates on time, we encourage you to contact Council's rates staff who are available to assist.

#### **Change of postal address**

Please advise Council in writing (or via Councils Website) should you have a change of postal or email address. We require address information to ensure you receive your rate notice in sufficient time to make payment in full.
