More Mega Murals for YP

Yorke Peninsula Council has taken its Southern YP Water Tower Mural Trail to a new level with two massive new pieces of artwork at Wool Bay and Minlacowie.

The Minlacowie mural, south of Minlaton – one of the largest in the state at almost six metres high and more than 100 metres around – was designed and painted by Mike Makatron, with the assistance of Conrad Bizjak, Dylan Butler, Harley Hall, Jason Swales and Sabine Meyer.

It is now adorned with local animals, flora and scenery, recognising the culture of the Narungga people of Yorke Peninsula as well as the region's rich agriculture and natural beauty.

The Wool Bay tank was designed and painted by Sam Brooks with the assistance of Harley Hall, Mark Harding, Rachele Plazeriano and Gary Nowlan.

It features history starting with Narungga First Nations then progressing to the early days of the Wool Bay port on the SA Water shed, transitioning to modern-day Wool Bay with flora, fauna and more on the tank.

The project was made possible with \$130,000 funding from the Australian Government through the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, and \$20,000 from SA Water.

"Council is excited about the expansion of the SYP Water Tower Mural Trail which already includes amazing murals at Yorketown, Port Vincent, Stansbury, Coobowie and Edithburgh," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"The Minlacowie and Wool Bay tanks are both real head turners with vibrant colours and beautiful artwork.

"Importantly, both include significant acknowledgement of Narungga history and culture."

Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Grants were put in place by the former Government to assist local communities to counteract the effects of

COVID-19 on local economies.

"It was so successful we decided to extend the funding stream, and the new Government has backed the program and I thank them for that.

"The program allows local councils, as the arm of government closest to communities, to determine its use.

"I fully back the process and council's choice to extend the water tower project.

"The towers have attracted enormous interest and are making a real contribution to the Yorke Peninsula economy, and they look fantastic."

Minlacowie tank lead artist Mike Makatron said the main idea for the tank was the four totems of the Narungga people which include the shark, eagle, kangaroo and emu.

"When designing this, I wanted an area where each artist had their time to shine or an area to focus on with the end product creating a story," he said.

"It is a challenge to work on tanks this big but it has been made a lot easier working with five different artists on the project.

"This project has taken nine days to complete which is a lot quicker than I thought but that is a result of having really skilled people to work with."

Wool Bay tank lead artist Sam Brooks said the big difference with large-scale jobs is always the people you deal with who can make or break a project.

"It has been great working with the Yorke Peninsula Council team and the local community, they have made it a very smooth and easy process," he said.

"The community is very happy with the design, we worked on it together and it's a great piece that will attract tourism to the area.

"We ended up with a design that focuses on local animals, plants as well as Narungga elements painted by local artist Harley Hall."

About the Murals

Minlacowie

Artists: Mike Makatron (lead artist), Conrad Bizjak, Dylan Butler, Harley Hall, Jason Swales (mentorship recipient), Sabine Meyer (junior mentorship recipient)

Design includes: Female red kangaroos (Narungga totem animal for the Wawi clan of the north) facing north, emus (Narungga totem animal for the Garrdi clan of the east) facing east, sharks (Narungga totem animal for the Widhadha clan of the south) facing south, eagles (Narungga totem animals for the Wildu clan of the west) facing west, the Narungga symbol for a meeting place, or community, Narungga line work, flora found in the Minlacowie region, the old Minlacowie homestead, the pink salt lakes of the Yorketown region just south of Minlacowie, taken from an aerial photograph by Adam Meyer of AdBe Photography (also a windmill based upon another AdBe photo), and a coastal scene of Port Minlacowie based on a painting by Terry Braund.

Wool Bay

Artists: Sam Brooks (lead artist), Harley Hall, Mark Harding, Rachelle Plazeriano (mentorship recipient), Garry Nowlan (junior mentorship recipient)

Design includes: Town history on the shed, starting with Narungga First Nations (including line work, significant fauna and symbol for meeting place/community) then progressing to the early days of the

Wool Bay port, modern Wool Bay on the tank with flora and fauna (taken from a photos supplied by Wool Bay residents), feature piece on the back of the tank 'Women in the clouds' in recognition of both the modern agricultural area's reliance on rainfall as well as women's contributions to Wool Bay throughout time.

About the SYP Water Tower Mural Trail

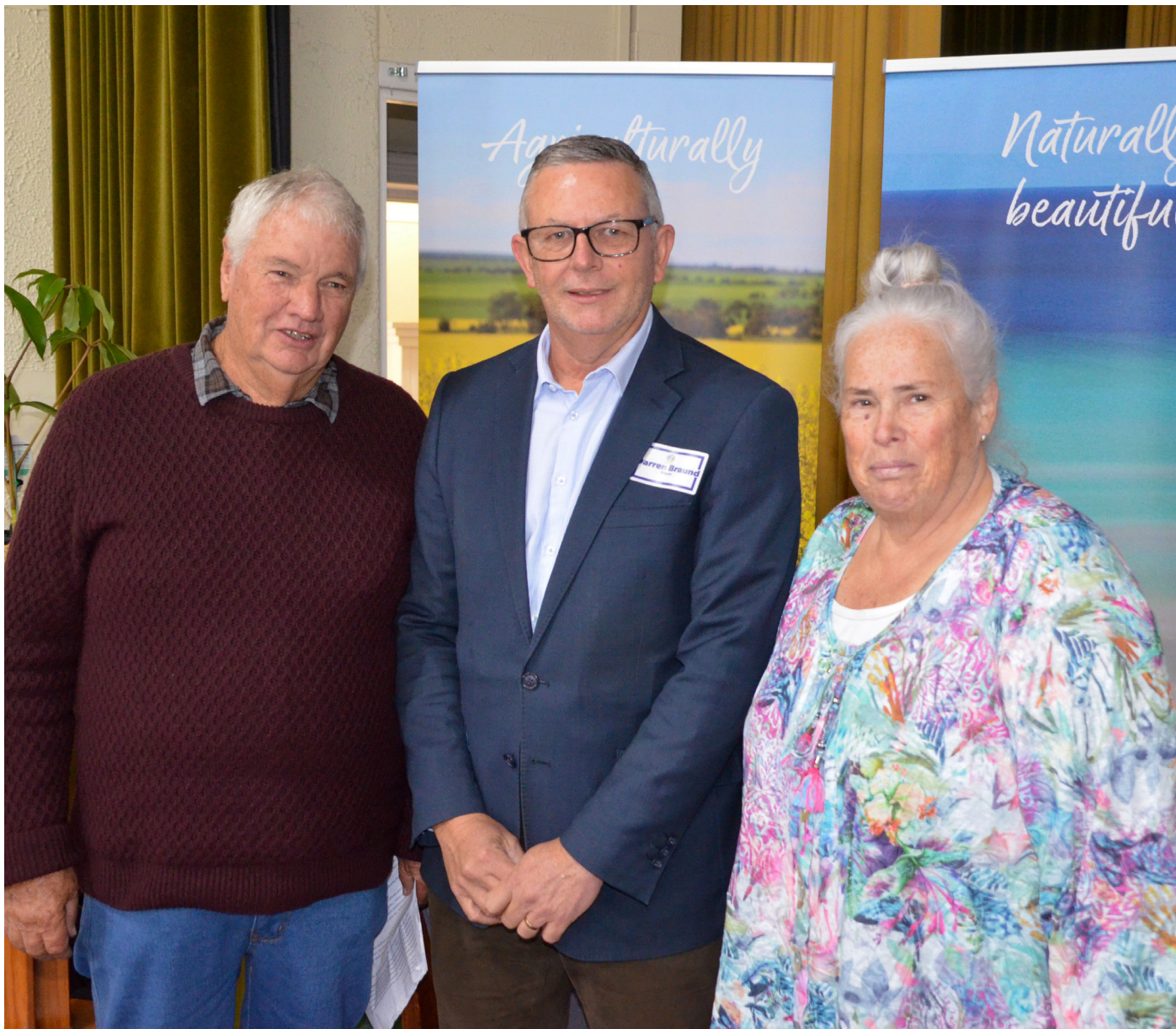
The SYP Water Tower Mural Trail features murals on the SA Water towers and tanks at Port Vincent, Stanbury, Wool Bay, Coobowie, Edithburgh, Yorketown and Minlacowie.

Port Vincent was the first town to initiate a water tower mural after Port Vincent Progress Association received \$54,000 through the federal government's Rural and Regional Renewal's Tackling Tough Times Together program in June 2020.

Yorke Peninsula Council, in partnership with Yorke Peninsula Tourism and the Coobowie, Edithburgh, Stanbury and Yorketown Progress Associations, was then successful in gaining funding for the Edithburgh, Stanbury, Yorketown and Coobowie murals through the Regional Tourism Bushfire Recovery Grant program.

This program aimed to assist the economic and social recovery of regions affected by the 2019 bushfires through art projects.

Nharangga Minlagawi Cultural Day

More than 200 people attended the Nharangga Minlagawi Cultural Day on Sunday, 7 May.

The event offered locals and visitors of all ages a chance to learn about traditional science, knowledge, skills, culture and caring for Nharangga Banggara (Narungga Country).

The celebration of Nharangga dhura (Narungga people) and culture was held at Minlagawi Gum Flat Reserve at Minlaton.

"The Nharangga Minlagawi Cultural Day was again a huge success, celebrating and showcasing culture, food and art," Environment Officer Letitia Dahl-helm said.

"During the Welcome to Country by Mia and Bri Warrior with Shanaid Hickman Sansbury, a cleansing Smoking Ceremony was conducted by Shane Warrior, the smoke passing over attendees.

"Coming together over food is culturally important to Nharangga dhura (Narungga people) and no one went hungry with damper by Auntie Daphney Rickett, kangaroo tail soup and emu sliders by the Nunga kids of Minlaton District School, and lemon myrtle melting moments and wattleseed biscuits by Nharangga Aboriginal Cultural Tours.

"Newchurch Family Farm's kangaroo and chicken tacos were extremely popular."

Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association had language resources and history books available for purchase, with many interested to

learn about traditions before colonisation.

"We received plenty of feedback about how enjoyable the guided walks by Shane and Steven Warrior of Nharangga Aboriginal Cultural Tours were," Ms Dahl-helm said.

"Many were keen to have their forehead painted by Mia and Bri Warrior and Tamiya and Shanaid Hickman-Sansbury or take part in dance workshops with acclaimed dance instructor Nikki Ashby.

"Also popular was string making and discovery of tools and objects with Clem Newchurch, totem nature craft with Bianca Newchurch and Lisa Weetra, feather wands with Jay Milera, and creation stories with Kylie O'Loughlin and her father Elder Uncle Dookie Kevin O'Loughlin."

The artist market, including Michael Wanganeen Jnr, Jay Milera, Kylie O'Loughlin and Asta Wanganeen, and Wadna (boomerang) throwing with Craig Warrior, were also popular.

The Nharangga Wambana Wanggadja (learning talking circle) with Elder Uncle Michael Wanganeen Snr and Michael Wanganeen Jnr was also an opportunity to learn and yarn.

Nharangga Minlagawi Cultural Day is proudly presented by Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association, Narungga Nation Aboriginal Corporation and Yorke Peninsula Council, with funding support from the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board's Grassroots Grants program and Country Arts SA.

Visual Merchandising Workshop

A VISUAL merchandising workshop held in Minlaton on Tuesday, May 2, inspired 20 participants from 15 different businesses across the Yorke Peninsula Council area.

Sarah Davies from The Merchandiser shared her tips and tricks for presenting brick-and-mortar businesses, inside and out, in eye-catching ways without spending excessive time or money.

"Visual merchandising is about how to bring more people into your shop and hopefully get them to buy something," she said.

"It is really important that small businesses start to fill their toolkits, they need to create a better shopping experience and continually improve.

"Visual merchandising is not a silver bullet – there is a massive connection between buying stock, merchandising the stock, and marketing the stock."

Sarah showed methods to make displays look inviting and organised, and how shop layouts can affect buyer behaviour, in addition to numerous other useful tactics for businesses of all types and sizes.

After a lunch prepared by host venue Minlaton Bowling Club representatives, attendees moved on to McMahon's Shoe Shop for a real-time demonstration.

Sarah turned the shop's window into a stunning autumn-themed display using inexpensive props that can be reused to suit other occasions using simple tweaks.

The workshop was organised by Muriel Scholz from the Yorke Peninsula Council Economic Development and Business Sustainability team.

Council mayor Darren Braund said it was great to have so many businesses participate.

"Business development workshops are a key part of Council's Economic Development and Tourism Strategy," he said.

"We look forward to seeing some inventive and inviting participating businesses

Edithburgh jetty works go swimmingly



Yorke Peninsula Council has completed much-needed work on the Edithburgh jetty to enhance the user experience.

Work included the extension of the southern steps for divers/swimmers to have a safe access into and from the water as well as the removal of the northern steps.

Operations South Leading worker Stuart Heinrich-Smith said conditions had to be perfect for the operation which required cranes to complete.

"The whole jetty carpark was blocked off and we had a good crowd watching from the two top carparks," Mr Heinrich-Smith said.

"We had a very good crew of four on the day with two being in the water for most of the install of the new ladder and removal of old stairs.

"The new ladder was bolted to the existing wooden stairs and extended down to the sea floor for easier egress for divers."

Mr Heinrich-Smith said the ladder also has a footing at the base which can slide out to be attached to the sea floor.

"The old northern steps were broken and dangerous and had to be removed," he said.

"After a couple of weeks planning on how the job was going to run the day went very well and everything went to plan."

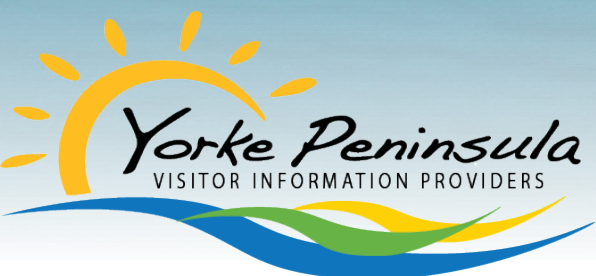

YP art festival breaks new ground

YORKE Peninsula's premier arts event will be transformed in 2023 as GROUNDED YP Art Festival replaces the former YP Art Exhibition. The Yorke Peninsula Council Arts and Culture Working Group is excited to announce the rebranded 10-day event which will feature the original exhibitions plus a range of added festivities.

The festival will be held across the peninsula from Friday, 11 August, to Sunday, 20 August, having previously been held during Easter.

"We recognise that 2023 offers Guuranda (Yorke Peninsula) the opportunity to utilise the growing popularity of experience-based tourism to attract visitors in August, a traditionally slower time for visitation," Yorke Peninsula Council Arts and Cultural Facilitator Sonya Rankine said.

"Our August-based festival will be part of the renowned and celebrated state-wide South Australia Living Artists Festival.

"GROUNDED replaces the Easter YP Art Exhibition and will offer music, dance, performing arts, First Nations Narungga food, art and culture, artisan foods, beverages, products and more."

Ms Rankine said the traditional exhibitions, offering prizes in fine art, sculpture and photography held in Ardrossan, Yorketown and Edithburgh, will continue and entries are encouraged via the website.

"Why GROUNDED, and what is the purpose of curating an arts festival for the people and visitors of Yorke Peninsula?" Ms Rankine asked.

"Yorke Peninsula's ground is ancient, significant, and productive, shack owners escape to the peninsula as it has a grounding and calming effect on one's mood.

"The community sets its roots in the peninsula's ground and works hard to produce excellent things for our people.

"Art is often healing, inclusive and ground-breaking, and it keeps us grounded."

Ms Rankine said the aim of the festival is to inspire and grow the celebration of the arts on the peninsula by nurturing creatives, traditional owners the Narungga People, residents, and shack owners.

"By offering numerous platforms for important storytelling and expression, we can connect with our visitors," she said.
