With 2023 drawing to a close it is the perfect time to reflect on the many positives that have been achieved in the past year.

Stage one of the North Coast Road, Point Turton, upgrade was completed with work on the next stage already underway.

This stage will double the length of sealed pavement along North Coast Road to a total of 3.64 kilometres.

It was fantastic to see the Southern Yorke Peninsula Water Tower Mural Trail extended with two massive new pieces of artwork at Wool Bay and Minlacowie.

We also had events galore. It was fantastic to bring back the traditional art exhibition through the expanded 10-day GROUNDED YP Art Festival. The festival included 42 events and workshops across more than a dozen locations and featured the original exhibitions plus a diverse range of added festivities including many workshops.

Hundreds of people attended another successful Nharangga Minlagawi Cultural Day which offered locals and visitors of all ages a chance to learn about traditional science, knowledge, skills, culture and caring for Nharangga Banggara (Narungga Country).

Council's two-day YorKON Games Convention again attracted big crowds and demonstrated our ongoing commitment to supporting local youth.

There was also a continued strong focus on supporting local businesses with Council maintaining its grants program, and hosting several free workshops including visual merchandising, money matters and business networking.

We also completed much-needed upgrades at the Maitland and Yorketown airstrips. The general aviation area at Maitland has been extended and given a new seal while at Yorketown Council improved air landing safety with the provision of new pilot-activated lighting.

These are just a few of the many highlights from across the past 12 months.

Thank you to Council staff, Elected Members and our wonderful community for making 2023 such a positive year and I look forward to this continuing into 2024.

Until then, on behalf of Yorke Peninsula Council, I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year.

2023 Highlights



COMPLETE... Stage one of the North Coast Road, Point Turton, upgrade was completed with work on the next stage already underway. Stage one included sealing, earthworks, stormwater management in-cluding the installation of stormwater drainage infrastructure, road delineation and installation of traffic control devices. Council received \$1,141,000 through the Special Local Roads Program's Supplementary Local Road Funding for stage one of the works. The total cost of stage one is estimated to be \$2,298,000 with Council contributing \$1,157,000 towards the project.



Community grant winners announced

Twenty-nine community groups and not-for-profit organisations will share in more than \$100,000 through the 2023-2024 Yorke Peninsula Council Community Grants scheme.

Council is committed to developing the region by providing funding opportunities through the annual grants.

The scheme provides financial grants for projects that provide a benefit to the wider community of the Yorke Peninsula Council region.

This year's projects range from paving and realigning paths to purchasing and installing defibrillators.

"Council is excited by the range and calibre of project submitted for the 2023-24 Community Grants Scheme," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"At the time closing, Council had 41 applications requesting total funding of \$152,412.46 for projects to the value of \$451,071.24. "While Council could not approve all applications, we thank everyone who applied and encourage those who missed out to try again next year."

360-degree views of murals

Visitors and locals can now enjoy 360-degree views of some of Yorke Peninsula Council's water tower murals.

Fenced walking paths now allow access right around murals on the Southern Yorke Peninsula Water Tower Mural Trail.

Visitors can follow the paths to the back of the murals, taking in the full scope of the award-winning artwork.

The murals at Stansbury, Wool Bay, Edithburgh and Yorketown all now have walking paths.

"We offer our sincere thanks and appreciation to the landowners

who have allowed us to install these paths," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"The paths are beneficial for enhancing the visitor experience at the murals as people can now see and photograph the works of art in their entirety.

"The paths also help the landowners by keeping people off of their land and out of their crops, so it is a win-win."

The dolomite paths and fences were designed in consultation with residents where necessary, and constructed using local contractors.

Unpaid rates debt may result in the imposition of fines and interest on top of amounts owing. Recovery of persistent outstanding rates debt may lead to the use of formal recovery processes which can substantially increase the debt payable to Council. We would prefer to avoid these situations and encourage timely communication in relation to your circumstances.

Some of the payment options available to you (dependent on circumstances) include:

- Weekly, fortnightly, or monthly regular payment arrangements (scheduled through your online banking)
- CentrePay payment deductions via Centrelink
- Lump sum payments on specific dates
- Seniors' postponements

If you are having trouble paying your rates on time, we encourage you to contact Council's rates staff who are available to assist.

Please advise Council in writing (or via Council's Website) should you have a change of postal or email address. We require address information to ensure you receive your rate notice in sufficient time to make payment in full.

About 22 individual sales across more than 10 locations registered as part of this year's Garage Sale Trail.

The national event, supported locally by Yorke Peninsula Council, ran across two weekends, November 11-12 and 18-19.

The event provided a fun way for residents to connect, make some money and minimise belongings going to landfill or being illegally dumped.

Garage sales from Arthurton to Yorketown offered Yorke Peninsula bargain hunters a massive range of preloved items.

More than 32,000 items were listed for sale with more than 11,220 kilograms projected to be reused over the weekend.

Mayor Darren Braund said keeping items in use for as long as possible by buying or selling makes sense for the environment.

"It was pleasing to see so many people out and about perusing the various garage sales," Mr Braund said.

"The Garage Sale Trail is all about finding new homes for old items,

boosting the circular economy and minimising landfill.

"Why throw something out when you could make some pocket money and let another person enjoy it for a long time to come?"

Garage Sale Trail is a not-for-profit social enterprise founded by Sydney mates, Darryl Nichols and Andrew Valder.

It seeks to educate Australians on the importance of reuse, and the need to take individual responsibility for the impact of our consumption habits whilst also building stronger, more connected and more resilient communities.

Now in its twelfth year, Garage Sale Trail has grown from a grass roots idea in Bondi Beach where it started in 2010 to being powered by 100 councils nationally and supported by PayPal, fashion resale partner Poshmark and the NSW Environment Protection Authority.

Council investigating more Bush Camping

Yorke Peninsula Council is looking to add two new lakeside campgrounds to its Bush Camping system.

Council has identified spaces at Pink Lake and Lake Fowler – two key locations among the 200-odd salt lakes in the Yorketown area – that could be used as official campgrounds in the near future.

Both are along the Yorke Peninsula Salt Lake Trail, a tourist trail opened in 2021 which has resulted in increased visitation, including by recreational vehicles.

"The sites at our beautiful pink lakes are already attracting visitors, so providing them with somewhere to stay overnight will be a welcome move," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"With changes planned following this summer to deal with

overcrowding at our 19 existing Bush Camps, it is also timely to add more camping sites to accommodate the many people who enjoy visiting Yorke Peninsula for camping.

"The salt lake campgrounds may also be preferred by campers during winter as they are away from coastal conditions and the lakes can be stunning at that time of year.

"We welcome camping tourism, and want to ensure campers have an enjoyable time rather than being unable to find sites or being packed tightly into campgrounds.

"We also know that for tourism to thrive in the long term, we need to protect our coastal environment, and unfortunately overcrowding at peak times has caused environmental concerns in recent years."



Council hosts Money Matters workshop

Money expert Julie Allerton shared the essentials of business finances, and tips on how to manage and cut costs, in Yorketown on Tuesday, October 24.

About 25 people representing 20 businesses, covering tourism, agriculture, trades, accommodation, the service industry and more, registered for the free Money Matters workshop at SYP Community Hub.

Julie discussed common bookkeeping tools such as Myob and Xero, and how to interpret and learn from financial reports such as the balance sheet and profit-loss statements.

She also discussed cashflow management, strategies for handling expenses and bills, and the importance of setting an annual budget. Participants received extensive take-home notes, checklists for improving cashflow, a draft budgeting tool and invitations for further tailored support.

Yorke Peninsula Council organised the event, with support from the Adelaide Business Hub and Regional Development Australia Yorke and Mid North.

"Council has now run several workshops and other initiatives as part of our growing commitment to supporting local businesses," Mayor Darren Braund said.

"We understand that with rising cost pressures, managing finances and finding efficiencies to save money is of great importance to the success of our businesspeople.

"I congratulate everyone who took time out of their busy workdays to improve their financial knowledge with this workshop, and encourage all business representatives to consider taking up these opportunities in the future.

"Council's business workshops have already included grants, accessibility, social media, shop design and more, and the support offered through our Business Enhancement Program extends well beyond this into direct assistance from staff as well as our popular business grants program which is open year-round.

"Successful businesses mean employment opportunities and a strong local economy, and as a Council we are proud to play our part in fostering this success."

ety Changes 20

SA Health has released a new Food Safety Standard 3.2.2A - Food Safety Management Tools.

This new Standard introduces requirements for all food service, catering, and retail businesses that handle unpackaged, ready-toeat, and potentially hazardous foods.

Impacted businesses must implement either two or three new food safety management tools depending on their category. The category is based on the risk of the food handling activities conducted by the business.

The tools include:

- Mandatory food handler training
- Implementation of a food safety supervisor(s)
- Substantiation of key food safety controls

Affected businesses must implement the tools before **8 December** 2023

FOOD SAFETY STANDARD 3.2.2A WHAT DO YOU NEED TO KNOW?

FOOD HANDLER TRAINING

Food handlers must do a food safety training course in OR show that they understand:



safe handling of food



food contamination



cleaning and sanitising equipment



personal hygiene

Applies to CATEGORY 1 and CATEGORY 2 businesses

FOOD SAFETY SUPERVISOR

A food business must have a food safety supervisor who:



is qualified



has a supervisor's certificate



can give advice to people who make food



is reasonably available

Applies to CATEGORY 1 and CATEGORY 2 businesses

SHOWING THAT YOUR FOOD IS SAFE

A food business must show that they are making safe food by:



keeping a record of important food safety controls/activities/processes



demonstrating safe food handling practices

Applies to CATEGORY 1 businesses ONLY

BUSINESS CATEGORY TYPES

CATEGORY 1

Businesses that make and serve food that is unpackaged. **Examples may include:**





fast food outlets

CATEGORY 2 Businesses that sell ready-to-eat food that is unpackaged and not made by the business.


